MINI-BIOS: Parker Hall, Frank Sinkwich, Henry Jordan, Ben Kish

PARKER HALL TB-QB

L. Parker 6-0 195 Mississippi B: 12/10/1916, Tunica, MS

From 1938 through 1945 the NFL had an official MVP who received the "Joe Carr Memorial Trophy." The second man to win this honor was Parker Hall of the Cleveland Rams. Hall had received All-American mention while at the University of Mississippi and joined the lowly Rams in 1939. As a single wing tailback and defensive back he rushed for 458 yards and two touchdowns, topped the leagues passers as he completed 51% of his passes for nine TD's and averaged 41 yards per punt. "I got a certain amount of glory out of that award," Parker recalled recently. "There was considerable publicity and I received it in an impressive ceremony before the Chicago All-Star Game."

In commenting on todays game Parker Hall felt the players were definitely bigger and more passes are thrown in one quarter than he would throw in an entire game.

Hall put in four seasons as the key man on a second division team, then spent three years in the service. As was the case with so many who put in their best athletic years in the service his comeback in 1946 with the 49ers of the AAFC was not a success. As a back up T-formation quarterback behind Frankie Albert he saw little action and did not return for the next season.

FRANK SINKWICH TB

Francis 5-11 185 Georgia B: 10/20/1920 McKees Rocks, PA

Frank Sinkwich of the Detroit Lions completely dominated NFL statistics in 1944 as he finished first in punting, second in scoring, third in rushing, fourth in punt returns and sixth in passing. He accounted for 62% of the Lions' total yardage.

One of the most publicized football players in history, Frank Sinkwich went from Chaney High School in Youngstown, Ohio to the University of Georgia. As a junior playing with a broken jaw protected by a huge shield, he led the nation in rushing with over one thousand yards and gained All-American honors. He repeated as an All American in 1943, scored the only touchdown in Georgia's Rose Bowl win, and topped off everything with the Heisman Award.

The Lions first round draft choice in 1943 he immediately became the top back on the squad. In 1944 he gained 563 yards for 6 TD's, passed for another 12 scores, punted, returned both punts and kickoffs, and became the only Heisman award winner to also be named the Official NFL MVP.

"After the 1944 season I went into the service," Frank recalled, "where I injured my knees several times and needed several surgeries. I tried to play for the Yankees of the AAFC in '46 and the Colts in '47. I should have never done this as I had been injured so much I was never able to play as I knew I was capable of playing."

HENRY JORDAN DT

Henry Wendell 6-3 250 Virginia B: 1/26/1935 Emporia, VA D: 2/21/1977 Milwaukee, WI

Henry Jordan was a great source of humorous quotes for the press, his best being, "Lombardi treats us all alike, like dogs." He was also a source of great aggravation to opposing line men during his 11 years as a Green Bay Packer.

A star football player and wrestler at the University of Virginia, Jordan was drafted by the Cleveland Browns, playing for them the 1957 and 1958 seasons. The Packers obtained him in 1959.

"I actually came to the Packers by mistake," Jordan once said. "The Browns offered Lombardi another player who was bigger than I. However, Vince got the names mixed up and took me. He was really surprised when he saw me as he thought I would be much bigger. Vince then turned this into an advantage as I was fairly fast; so he used myself and Willie Davis to rush the passers, while Dave Hanner and Bill Quinlan played the run."

"Playing with those fellows and later Lionel Aldridge and Ron Kostelnik, we got to know each other so well we never had to tell what we planned. Each knew what the other would do in any given situation." Jordan was chosen for the Pro Bowl following the 1960, 1961, 1963, and 1966 seasons. He was named to all-NFL teams each year from 1960-64, and was a consensus choice three times.

Another favorite anecdote of Jordan's: "One day Lombardi was lecturing us on how to conduct ourselves. He said we were paid like executives so we should act like them. I replied, 'Coach, if we are executives, how come we aren't served coffee at our meetings?' After that, we got coffee at every meeting."

In a career full of brilliant games Henry Jordan's best may have been against the L.A. Rams in the first Division Playoff format in NFL history following the 1967 season. On a frozen field the Rams immediately dominated the first quarter; however on third down Jordan broke through and threw Roman Gabriel for a significant loss. Bruce Gassett then tried what looked like a sure field goal only to have Henry Jordan block it. This turned the tide and the Packers went on to the Ice Bowl and Super Bowl wins.

Henry Jordan was in public service in Milwaukee when following a session of swimming he collapsed and died of a heart attack.

BEN KISH FB-BB

6-0 200 Pittsburgh B: 3/31/1917, Tonawanda, NY D: 2/24/1989, Philadelphia, PA

Kish was a fullback in the University of Pittsburgh's "Dream Backfield" for three years and was named as captain of the All- East team in 1940. He played in the College All-Star Game in Chicago that year. He was drafted on the 8th Round by the Chicago Cardinals, but his original college coach, Dr. "Jock" Sutherland, then in his first season as Brooklyn coach, acquired Kish for the Dodgers.

On December 7, 1941, Kish was in the Brooklyn lineup, playing against the New York Giants when word arrived of the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor. "The loudspeaker kept blaring for general so-and-so and colonel so-and-so to report immediately to such-and-such," he recalled. "We didn't know what was going on. Kish joined the army, but was discharged because of a physical problem in time to play in the 1943 season. In the interim, he had been dealt to the Eagles. A blocking back with the Dodgers, Kish fit nicely into "Greasy" Neale's Eagles, where the fullback was primarily a blocker and defender.

Kish stayed with the Eagles through their championship years, retiring in 1949. He later was an assistant coach at Drexel and Temple, and worked as a salesman in the metal industry.
